

## Hinduism – Why do Hindus want to collect good karma?

<b>karma</b>	Literally means 'action', but implies both action and its consequences.
<b>reincarnation</b>	The belief that when you die, your souls live on and moves into a new body on numerous occasions.
<b>Hindus</b>	People who practise a religion called Hinduism.
<b>Samsara</b>	The cycle of birth, death and reincarnation.
<b>moral</b>	A lesson that can be derived from a story or experience.

Hindus believe that whatever people do produces a result which cannot be avoided.

Hindus believe that, even though they do not remember them, every human has had many past lives, starting as lesser life forms and evolving into human form; this is known as the theory of reincarnation.

Hinduism originated in India.


## Chitram Moksha
